Please read through this newsletter to see what we have been up to this past month. Thanks for your time.



STAR and BAS Tests

We finished our first round of STAR testing, and we are almost done with our fall BAS (reading) testing.

We've completed most of our ELA pre-assessments for the year, too.

Math



We just finished our first math unit last week, and this week we have started Unit 2. This unit focuses on multiplication and geometry. Our first lessons have been about square numbers and arrays, using the formula for area, and factors and factor pairs.

You should have received the second FAMILY LETTER on Monday in your child's HOMEWORK folder. These FAMILY LETTERS are very helpful with questions you or your child might have. Be sure to save these as they are useful throughout the unit.

Your child has a BLUE password page in his/her binder that contains all of his/her passwords to online programs that we use in math and spelling. the Everyday Math website is great if your child forgets his/her Study Link, to play games related to the unit we are studying, to access the Student Reference Book, and to help with any student or parent questions.

I mentioned Reflex in our last newsletter. All students should spend some time during the week or on the weekend working on their math facts. Automaticity is the goal. It really does help with everything else we learn in math!

Social Studies/Science



Last week we took our geography assessment on continents and oceans. The class did a great job on this unit, and I think they had fun with our Jeopardy game and fun videos as we learned more and more about our world!

We will begin our first science unit next Friday. We will begin by talking about science tools and processes.

Language Arts

Our first unit, The Arc of the Story, will culminate in the writing of a realistic fiction story. The students have all chosen a story idea, are working on character traits, and are jumping in and choosing problems that their characters will navigate through their individual stories.

In reading, our first unit is Interpreting Characters. We are reading Tiger Rising as we learn about the best ways to choose books, how to read intensely, developing comprehension skills as we focus on the characters in our books.

We will begin our Sitton Spelling program this week. Spellingcity.com is a great online resource where your children can practice spelling words that they should know.

As I've been giving BAS reading tests to the kids, I've noticed a lot of "summer slide." When I chat with the kids about this, it's pretty usual to find out that those who have lost some of their gains from last year didn't read a lot this past summer. We need to get those gains back by reading, reading, reading!

Reading logs are being completed regularly, but we are still having some issues with students not

meeting their goals and/or not completing the reading response on the back of the log. We write reminders daily in the plan books so the students need to be taking responsibility for this weekly assignment.

Hadley was our very first student to be celebrated as the Star of the Week! She did a terrific job sharing



about herself. Our second Star of the Week was Emmy! It was so fun to see what the girls both brought in to share about themselves. the kids trying to solve these mystery identities by asking smart questions and thinking through the clues.

We're All Different

We had an amazing presentation from the Cromwell Center. This program shares that disabilities come in all shapes and sizes—some more obvious than others. The kids were led through several activities that gave them experiences to "feel" what it must be like to learn differently. They also looked at pictures of famous people and tried to guess which, if any, had a disability. What they are learning is that you can't always tell our differences from just looking. There are many invisible disabilities, too.



It's always important to know that we all need different things in a classroom. Some might need more communication about what they are learning. Others might need preferential seating. Some might need things scribed for them. Fair isn't always equal. I find that 4th graders seem to have a very good grasp of this concept!

We often watch videos from Special Books by Special Kids. These are videos of people, often children, who have some sort of disability. The purpose of these videos is to show that no matter what you look like, how you learn, etc....most people just want to be liked, to have a friend. These videos also expose the kids to the diversity of people in our world.

We are also reading Wonder in class. If you haven't read this or seen the movie, it's a wonderful story about a young boy with some facial deformities. As with Special Books by Special Kids, Auggie just wants to fit in and

be liked. Isn't that what we all want?
