Dear Parents,

Even though this is only our first full week of school, I feel that our group has bonded already! We've had a great beginning to the year.

The kids seem to be a very cohesive group already. This is a great sign of an awesome year ahead! We are taking routines and academic subjects very slowly. In the Responsive Classroom philosophy, it is stressed that taking this precious time to explain rules, routines, and expectations truly does pay off in the end. This pace also allows us time to get to know each other, for modeling of those things which make our class run smoothly, what/where items are and where they go, and gives time for the students to feel confident and comfortable in their new environment. I am seeing the benefits of this already.

It was nice to see so many of you at our Information Meet and Greet. Labor Day weekend seemed more relaxing having started school before. I hope you all felt that, too.

Communication is a priority to me. Please know that I welcome notes, emails, and communication of any kind. It's important that we work together to insure that your child has a positive and successful 4th grade experience.

To go along with this philosophy I like to read books and lead discussions that send positive messages about being ourselves, accepting differences, and doing our best. One of my mottos is LET YOUR SPARKLE SHINE! All of my students are my stars, and I want them to learn that they each have very special attributes and abilities that allow them to shine. I believe that building a positive classroom community will encourage and enable us all to do our best while working together this year.



Who Are You Going to Gall?

gave the children my phone number on the Homework Expectations handout. This is in your child's homework binder. I have encouraged THEM to call me if they have news to share or questions about homework, etc... We have also talked a little about phone etiquette. If I'm not home I will only return calls before 8 P.M. Hopefully the kids are in bed by then anyway! I think this helps to encourage them all to take more responsibility for their learning.

Math

We use the latest Everyday Math edition which is based on the Common Core State Standards. We began math with a beginning of the year pre-assessment. We began our first unit last Thursday. We are working on developing routines for mental math, slate work, and daily math messages. Our first



lessons have focused on place value, rounding numbers, and becoming familiar with our Student Reference Books. You have received our first FAMILY LETTER on Monday in your child's HOMEWORK folder. These FAMILY LETTERS come home at the beginning of each unit. Be sure to save these and read through

them as they offer lots of insight into what your child will be doing in each unit of math. They also offer selected answers (to use in helping your child) to the Home Links that your child will bring home on most Mondays through Thursdays. Your child has also been given a password to access ConnectEd. The Everyday Math site has many great resources for students and families.

I will take some time exploring the Everyday Math website with the class, showing them what's available, and where to find things.

All of our students will be doing Reflex math this year. You have received info about this along with your child's password. Reflex is a program that helps children master their basic math facts. It's vital that children work on these skills because they will make everything else we do so much easier. I would encourage all of our students to practice these basic math facts often. Automaticity is the goal.

First Few Weeks

We are slowly getting into what will become our normal routines. We've now gone to all of our specials Students should remember to bring library books back into school for Monday's library class. Thursday is P.E., and the kids should all wear or bring in sneakers.

We will start to settle into more of our schedules as we learn more and more about our 4th grade curriculum and each other. I'm happy to share that so far caring attitudes and enthusiasm have been amazing!

Social Studies/Science

As you are aware, we will be making globes this Friday. The kids are really looking forward to this. You will be able to see our finished products later in the month at Open House. Thanks to many of you for already volunteering. We can't have too many helpers. So continue to send in your clippers if you want to help. Thanks so much.



We will alternate between social studies and science units this year. Geography is where we are beginning.

Language Arts

In writing we are taking things slowly. We have taken 2 writing pre-assessments on narrative and opinion writing, and tomorrow we will do an informational one. Our first writing unit will be The Arc of Story: Writing Realistic Fiction.

We will do a reading pre-assessment next week. We do these as we begin each of our reading units. This piece will help the class as they learn about characters in our first reading unit. We have been working with our reading logs and reading every single day whether at home or at school or both! I've been very impressed with the kids and how quickly they have adopted to our reading and log routines. Thanks to you all, too. We will be working on choosing books, comprehension, fluency, accuracy, and increasing our reading stamina as the year progresses.

Testing!!

I will begin giving reading benchmark tests to each student in the next few weeks. BAS (Benchmark Assessment System) is the reading test given at every grade level to assess your child's guided reading level. I will be asking for volunteers to test before or after school as/if needed. I love this time because it allows me one on one time with your child, getting to know them, their learning style, and abilities. Many times the kids enjoy this time, too

Toward the end of September and possibly into October the kids will take the STAR test! This is one of the standardized tests that we take here at CRES. Our class will be taking the reading and the math STAR assessments possibly in the next week or so. These tests will be repeated later in the year, too.

I try very hard to keep any and all testing situations relaxed. To do this, I really stress doing our best EACH and EVERY day. That way I just want the kids to do what I ask of them every day. We also do some fun stretches before or during to keep the kids energized and calm while working. I promise that we aren't testing 24/7! There are just many things that have to be done at the beginning of the year to be sure that your child is progressing as the year continues.



Star Attraction Weeks

A different student will be our STAR ATTRACTION during one week of the school year. I try to schedule these around children's birthdays while also making sure each student gets a 5-day week, but that isn't always possible. Next week, we will begin this activity. When it's your child's week, I will send home a letter with directions about this week and a poster for your child to do at home. This is a neat way to celebrate each student and learn more about each other at the same time.

During weeks where we don't have Star of the Weeks, we will have Mystery Stars. These will be York School Department staff who have graciously agreed to share with us each day of their week. The class will try and guess who they are! It's a fun way to learn more about those we work with while also focusing on good questioning strategies.

Newsletters and Galendars

I'm toying with weekly newsletters vs monthly ones, and I promise that future ones will be MUCH, MUCH shorter than this first one! This one has a lot of important information to get out to you. After this, newsletters will be more about updating and sharing what we are up to. I'm also thinking about utilizing Bloomz more for this type of communication. Stay tuned!

Calendars will be updated online regularly and sent out on a monthly basis starting tomorrow.

Growth Mindset

This year we will spend time talking and learning about Growth Mindset.

The big idea behind this is that WE CAN ALL LEARN AND GROW! However, we can't do that without effort, mistakes, learning from others, and trying our best! The kids "get" this, but we still need to exercise our brain more. My hope is that this mindset will lead to learners and problem solvers who are willing to take risks, not give up, and believe in themselves.

Glass Additions

Since class lists were sent out, we have had 3 additions to our classroom community. Hudson came to York in time to begin school on the first day with us. Jaelyn was at CRES in 2nd grade, and we are very happy to have her return. Next week, Graeme will be joining us. The boys are excited because now we will have 9 boys and 9 girls! Welcome to these 3 families and their 4th graders!

Goals

My goals are to encourage my students to be the best that they can be and to prepare them for the transition into 5th grade. I strive to maintain a safe atmosphere that will allow and encourage all of my students to grow, learn, and keep their individuality! I care about them! I'm looking forward to a great year with this very nice group of children!

Dismissal Changes

Just a reminder—any time your child's dismissal changes from their "usual" plans, you must write a note and send it in. If your child is traveling to someone else's home, please be sure to include names and addresses. We CANNOT accept dismissal changes through email. They must go

through the office. It's always best if your child's after school plans are solidified before they leave for school. Any emergency changes need to be made through a call to the school. These calls should be made by 11 A.M. These procedures prevent classroom interruptions and keep us all more focused on learning!

Plan Books & Homework Folders

As you are already aware, your child is coming home nightly with a binder, plan book pages and a HOMEWORK folder. Hopefully our actual plan books will arrive soon. This plan book is used everyday to record assignments, homework, and any other important reminders. Please sign or initial your child's plan book nightly. This helps to keep the lines of communication open between you, your child, and me. This plan book is also a great responsibility builder, and it also prepares the students for the more extensive plan book that they will be using at the Middle School.

All homework, notes home, etc...are put in your child's homework folder at the end of each day. I look at each child's plan book each morning. The kids have a routine for passing in notes and homework. The kids have been doing a terrific job with homework so far and understanding our morning routines. The plan book is also a great place for me to jot down notes, and you can use them to communicate with me, also. If you want to put dismissal info in your child's plan book, please be sure to write it on the page you are initialing or signing each night.

Blue Folders

Most Wednesdays the BLUE home/school folders are sent home. There are often notices that are sent home via e-mail, too. Please be sure to read through all of these to be sure you and your children are aware of events. Please return the folders weekly.

Daily Work

Daily work is always due the following morning. Accuracy, as well as neatness/handwriting, should be stressed in each assignment. Four times each week you will see a Home Link as math homework. Eventually the kids might also have other work to complete from the school day. In addition, I would like to encourage students to read for approximately 20 minutes nightly or whenever possible. Reading is so important in every aspect of your child's education. 4th graders are expected to have between 45-60 minutes of homework nightly. Although I don't give homework on Fridays, weekends can always be used to catch up on missing or late work, study math facts, or read.

If work is not completed on time or materials aren't at school, you will receive a small label in your child's plan book. This enables me to keep you informed of the daily progress of your child. The student will also be required to complete the late work AFTER their daily work is completed. When available, recess time might be used to complete work that wasn't completed on time.

I can already tell that you are encouraging your children to show good responsibility by coming to school prepared with the appropriate books, materials, assignments, and binder. Good study habits are very important. Any night when your child does not have any specific homework,

encourage them to spend their homework time practicing math facts, reading, writing, or practicing priority words. They all have <u>spellingcity.com</u>, EDM, Reflex and Google passwords on their PASSWORD page in their binders. If your child doesn't seem to have enough or has too much homework, please let me know.

Daily Schedule

A detailed (and still work in progress) daily schedule will soon be available on our website. Some details are still being worked on. Our specials' schedule was listed earlier in this letter. It's very important for your child to be at school AND on time. Those first few minutes of class usually include morning work that sets the tone for the rest of our day. It's inevitable that we all have doctor appointments or something throughout the year. If at all possible, it's best when kids can come into school for as much of the day as possible. However, you know your child best. If this isn't what is best for your child, I get it. As always, I will defer to your best judgment.
